Description Moonambel's ANZAC Avenue consists of 52 trees arranged as a double row either side of the main road. Various species of trees were originally selected and planted and protected by tree guards.

Over time some trees were replaced with different species and all plaques disappeared.

In 2015, the Moonambel Arts & History Group, supported by the Pyrenees Shire, brilliantly restored the Avenue, replanting 8 trees and installing 52 new tree plaques.



LEST WE FORGET

Willunga Avenue of Honour

On 25 April 1915, Australian forces landed on the Turkish coast of Gallipoli and began a campaign that grew into the ANZAC legend. The Willunga Avenue of Honour commemorates the sacrifices of the soldiers with the planting of 100 eucalyptus trees to honour the fallen, the wounded and those who fell.

THE CAMPAIGN

Gallipoli marked the first major conflict of Australian armed forces since entering World War I in August 1914. It was an arduous military campaign that failed to bring control of the Çanakkale Peninsula and Dardanelles Strait and gave the way to the capture of Constantinople (now Istanbul, Turkey), the capital of the Ottoman Empire. Fighting on a steep, unchanging terrain of the coast against a fierce and determined foe, Australian forces suffered 26,111 casualties including

8,141 deaths. The battle ended with the evacuation of all troops on 19 and 20 December 1915.

While it would ultimately have no impact on the outcome of the war, the Gallipoli campaign became emblematic of courage, endurance, sacrifice and loyalty to the foundation of the ANZAC legend.

THE AVENUE

The Avenue of Honour is a plantation of 100 eucalyptus trees (Gully gum) that was replanted in 1975 to honour the fallen. The trees were planted in 1975 to honour the fallen.


AVENUE OF HONOUR, EUMUNDUL QLD

Eighty-seven men from Eumundul and the surrounding district served in World War I. The memorial avenue of fig and other trees was planted to honour the 30 men who died or were killed, with each tree being accompanied by a small plaque. On 6 October 1927 (Australia Day) were planted in memory of local heroes who had fallen at the Front. On 12 October 1928, further twelve trees were planted by the nearest relatives of the Eumundul heroes who had fallen at the front. On 23 August 1919 another two trees were planted, making a total of twenty memorial trees planted in Eumundul. The Avenue of Honour was dedicated on 6 October 1927. ANZAC AVENUE, BERRBURUM, QLD

Memorial Trees were planted in the main street of the Berrburum Soldier Settlement in 1920 and the street renamed ANZAC Avenue in honour of the soldiers who died or were killed in World War I. The first tree in the avenue was planted by General Birdwood when he visited the Soldier Settlement for the dedication on 17 May 1920. On 1 August 1920, under the supervision of the settlers, 33 school children planted 37 weeping figs, 25 Washingtonia palms and four pine trees. ANZAC Avenue is the only identified memorial created by returned servicemen of a soldier settlement scheme in honour of their fellow comrades. The Berrburum Soldiers' Settlement was the first and largest of approximately two dozen soldier settlements established throughout Queensland, with at least 400 soldiers settling at Berrburum.

AVENUES OF HONOUR



WOODFORD AVENUE OF HONOUR, QLD

After an Anzac Day service held by Rev E. Aswell (late Sgt of AIF) on 25 April 1920, an avenue of 24 trees in Archer Street (D'Aguilar Highway) was planted and dedicated, commemorating soldiers from the Woodford district who died in service or were killed in action during World War I. Each tree has a plaque with a soldier's name on it.

ANZAC AVENUE MEMORIAL STREET, HAWKESBURY, NSW

In 1924 a row of sugar gum trees was planted each side of Barwan Street, between Doyle and Dawnhurst Streets, to commemorate the fallen. In the mid to late 1920s the trees were removed by council due to their deteriorating health. More suitable trees were planted in their place.

GOULBURN EAST PUBLIC SCHOOL NSW

Park Road Memorial Drive was planted in memory of citizens of East Goulburn who served in World War I. The Honour Avenue, originally consisting of 70 trees with guards, was planted and dedicated in September 1920. Many of those in whose name the trees were planted attended the School.

BAULKHAM HILLS MASONIC SCHOOL AVENUE OF HONOUR, NSW

The 364 Brush Box Trees along the avenue of the western boundary of the Masonic School, Seven Hills Road, Baulkham Hills commemorate the masons from New South Wales who died or were killed in World War I. A list of their names is displayed on the memorial at the northern end of the avenue.

TRINDLE AVENUE OF REMEMBRANCE, NSW

Atchaf and Kurrupong trees were planted to commemorate those who served in World War I and World War II. The first trees were planted and dedicated on Sunday 1 July 1927.

EIGHTH DIVISION MEMORIAL AVENUE AND REMEMBRANCE MALL GUNNEDAK, NSW

This is a two-tiered concrete memorial wall with flagpoles, in memory of the fallen of the 8th Division and Supporting Forces 1939-1945, opened on 8 December 1957 by Lt General H Gordon Bennett C.B., C.M.G., D.S.O., V.D., Commander of 8th Div. Small brass plaques are under each tier.

ANZAC AVENUE MEMORIAL STREET, HAWKESBURY, NSW

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BALDING MEMORIAL AVENUE, NSW

Dedicated to the men and women of this district who served, especially those who did not return, is an avenue of trees, at the centre of which is a granite marker with dedicatory plaque and flag staff. The trees in War Memorial Avenue, planted in July 1920, and dedicated on 11 November 2000, replace the "Soldiers Memory Avenue" planted in August 1919, which no longer exists.

BLACKHATH WAR MEMORIAL ARCH, NSW

The Blackbath Memorial Arch stands at the entrance to Memorial Park in Blackbath in the Blue Mountains, erected in memory of the 76 Blackbath residents who headed the call and enlisted to fight in World War I. The foundation stone was set by Australia's former war-time Prime Minister William (Billy) Hughes on 10 November 1928 and unveiled the following year by the NSW Governor, Admiral Sir Dudley De Chair on 25 May 1929. The arch is in the form of a triumphal arch, but lacks a neo-classical motif. The memorial arch is made from a pale fine-grained granite with inset trachyte panels which contain the 76 names of local men who served overseas in the war, including six who died on active service, and it cost local residents £300. There are plaques dedicated to World War I, World War II, Korea, Malaya, Borneo, Vietnam, and the Gulf War.

MAROOCHA AVENUE OF REMEMBRANCE, NSW

Along the Princes Highway at Maroocha, the Avenue commemorates those who served in World War II.

WORLD WAR I 'AVENUES OF HONOUR'


The trees in this avenue were planted as a living tribute to the men from the local district who sacrificed their lives during the First World War (1914-18). Historical records indicate that 499 men enlisted from the Balmoral Shire district.

An avenue of 67 weeping figs (*Ficus benjamina*) was planted on 27 September 1919 by the families of fallen servicemen and 19 of the original trees remain today. The trees were affixed with a metal plate bearing the name of each fallen soldier. In 2014, 15 *Ficus benjamins* were planted to reinstate the honour avenue.


The Right Honourable, the Lord Mayor of Brisbane, Councillor Graham Quirk, officially re-dedicated this avenue on 14 April 2015.

History of the Moonambel ANZAC Avenue

In July 22, 1918, a public meeting was held to discuss the planting of the Avenue of Honour. Fifty two trees were purchased with Shire Council funds which included 26 Cypress Pine, 8 Oriental Plane, 6 English Oak, 6 English Elm and 6 Silky Oak. Local volunteers planted the trees with the pines placed alternately. Tree guards were also erected. On August 17, 1918 the Dedication of ANZAC Avenue was made.

G.R.Hope's tree was to be the Tree No.1 as he was the first soldier from Moonambel, 'killed in action' at Lone Pine.

Over time, some trees were replaced with different species and all the plaques disappeared. In 2015, Moonambel Arts & History Group restored Moonambel's ANZAC Avenue by replanting 8 trees and placing 52 tree plaques.




